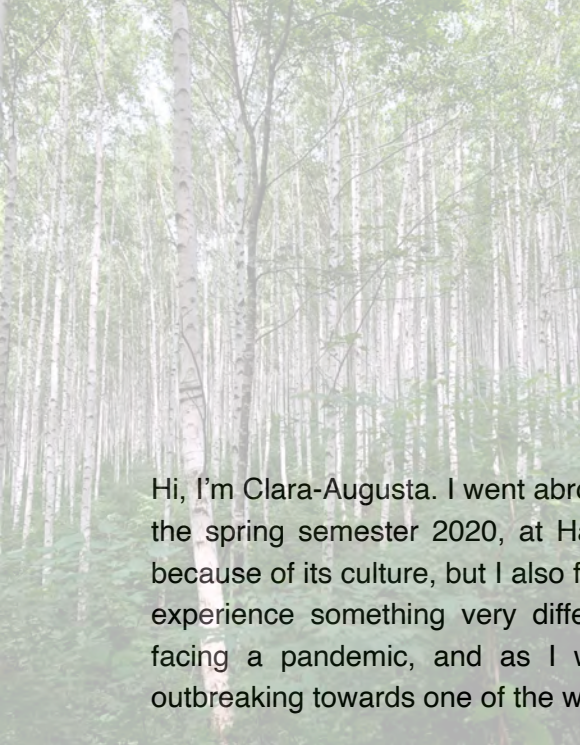

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INTRODUCTION

Hi, I'm Clara-Augusta. I went abroad during my Communication Design & Media Top-up on KEA for the spring semester 2020, at Hanyang UniversityERICA. I chose to go to (South) Korea mainly because of its culture, but I also felt like going as far away as possible now that I had the chance to experience something very different from Denmark and Europe. Unfortunately, the world was facing a pandemic, and as I was leaving Denmark in late February, Korea was COVID19-outbreaking towards one of the worst affected countries in the world.



As you might have guessed already, not many things turned out as I expected during my trip. Luckily the Korean government and health care system was very effective in handling the virus, and I quickly got used to always wearing a mask and doing temperature checks before entering stores, bares, cafes, etc.

Due to the virus, many exchange students either chose themselves or were told to cancel their exchange programs, and hurry back to their home countries. After all, I think we were approximately 25 exchange students who chose to stay anyway and go through with our semesters.

Even though this exchange experience (hopefully) was an exception due to the pandemic, I hope you'll find some parts helpful.

EXPERIENCES AT THE HOST UNIVERSITY

THE CAMPUS GROUND AND DORMITORIES

The Hanyang University Erica is a huge campus with convenience stores and a few café and food opportunities, and you'll see some people actually driving on bikes and scooters to get around. The dormitories which are provided by the school, are divided by gender and you'll most likely be sharing a room with another exchange student.

Before going I had already decided not to stay at the campus dormitories, as I wanted to stay in Seoul (approximately 1,5 hours from Ansan, where the campus is located) and experience the city during my stay. In the end, I didn't have to think about going back and forth to school every day since all classes were all online, so I was really happy with my decision. Even though it's pretty convenient to go back and forth with both subway and bus, I think I would've been tired of the time-consuming transportation if the courses were running as normal.

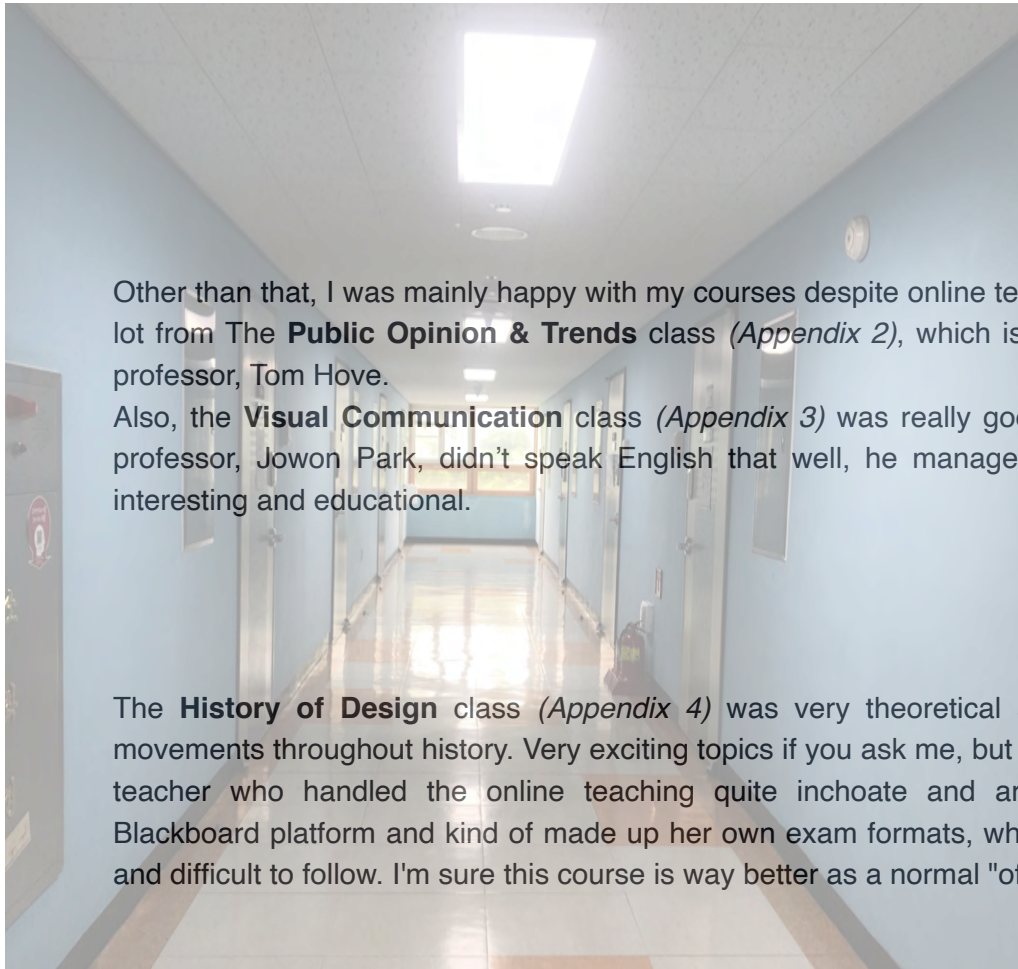
COURSES

During my semester at Hanyang University Erica, all courses were taught online. As mentioned previously, Covid19 was taking over the country just as the semester was to start, so everything was pretty chaotic, especially in the beginning. On top of this, the whole semester was postponed, which gave me a few weeks of unexpected free-time when I arrived. Unfortunately, we never got to attend physical classes on the campus, and the exams were held mainly as written assignments or multiple-choice tests through the Blackboard platform (corresponding to KEA's Fronter). The university was very concerned about the virus and implemented a lot of initiatives to support the students and prevent further spread of the virus.

I attended the following courses on Hanyang University Erica during the spring semester:

Be prepared that most Korean professors don't speak very well English even though they teach international courses. I'm sure it will be easy for you to go along. The course **Creative Design for Interdisciplinary Computing Technology** (*Appendix 1*) was even mainly taught in Korean, and its curriculum is (surprisingly) "spread out" over two semesters because you have to choose a track for the second semester. This means that we only had (Korean) introductions to the different tracks within the course in my semester. Although the content seemed interesting, I wouldn't recommend this course to any exchange students except those who speak Korean and stay for more than one semester.



Other than that, I was mainly happy with my courses despite online teaching. I especially learned a lot from The **Public Opinion & Trends** class (*Appendix 2*), which is taught by a great American professor, Tom Hove.

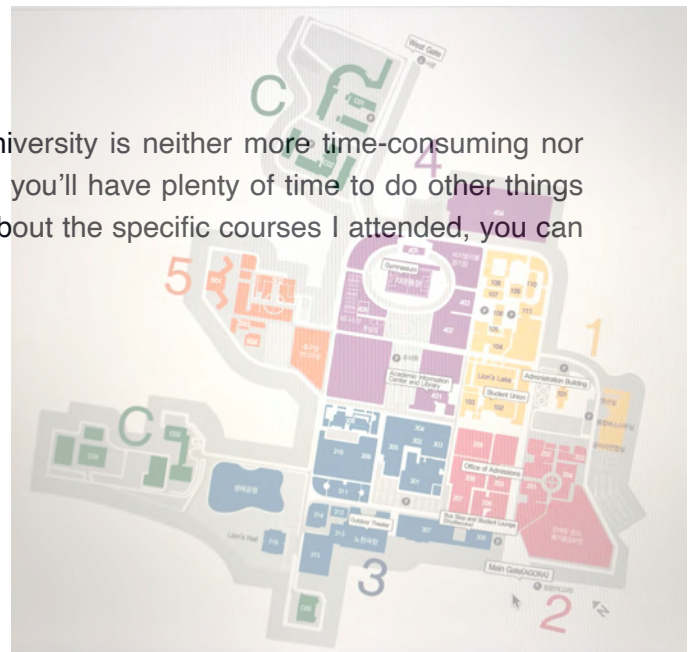
Also, the **Visual Communication** class (*Appendix 3*) was really good. Even though our Korean professor, Jowon Park, didn't speak English that well, he managed to make the classes very interesting and educational.

The **History of Design** class (*Appendix 4*) was very theoretical and mainly focussed on art movements throughout history. Very exciting topics if you ask me, but I wasn't really happy with our teacher who handled the online teaching quite inchoate and arrogant. She didn't use the Blackboard platform and kind of made up her own exam formats, which were very unprofessional and difficult to follow. I'm sure this course is way better as a normal "offline" course.

On top of these courses I attended a "Survival Korean" course (*screenshot of our class on the front-page*) and Taekwondo. I did both of these courses for my own sake, to get a better understanding of the Korean culture, and they didn't count as a part of my KEA curriculum.

I can strongly recommend you to do the **Survival Korean** (*Appendix 5*) as it is a great chance to get a hold of the language while you're here. Unfortunately, **Taekwondo** (*Appendix 6*) was somewhat inadequate because of the online teaching, but the instructor, Hye-soo Cho, seemed really nice and proficient, and I heard that he used to be the coach of the Korean Olympic Taekwondo team.

All in all, I wouldn't say that studying at Hanyang University is neither more time-consuming nor more difficult than what we're used to from KEA, and you'll have plenty of time to do other things while you're abroad. If you would like to know more about the specific courses I attended, you can find more detailed class syllables in the appendices.





SOCIAL AND CULTURAL EXPERIENCES

STAYING AND SOCIALIZING IN SEOUL

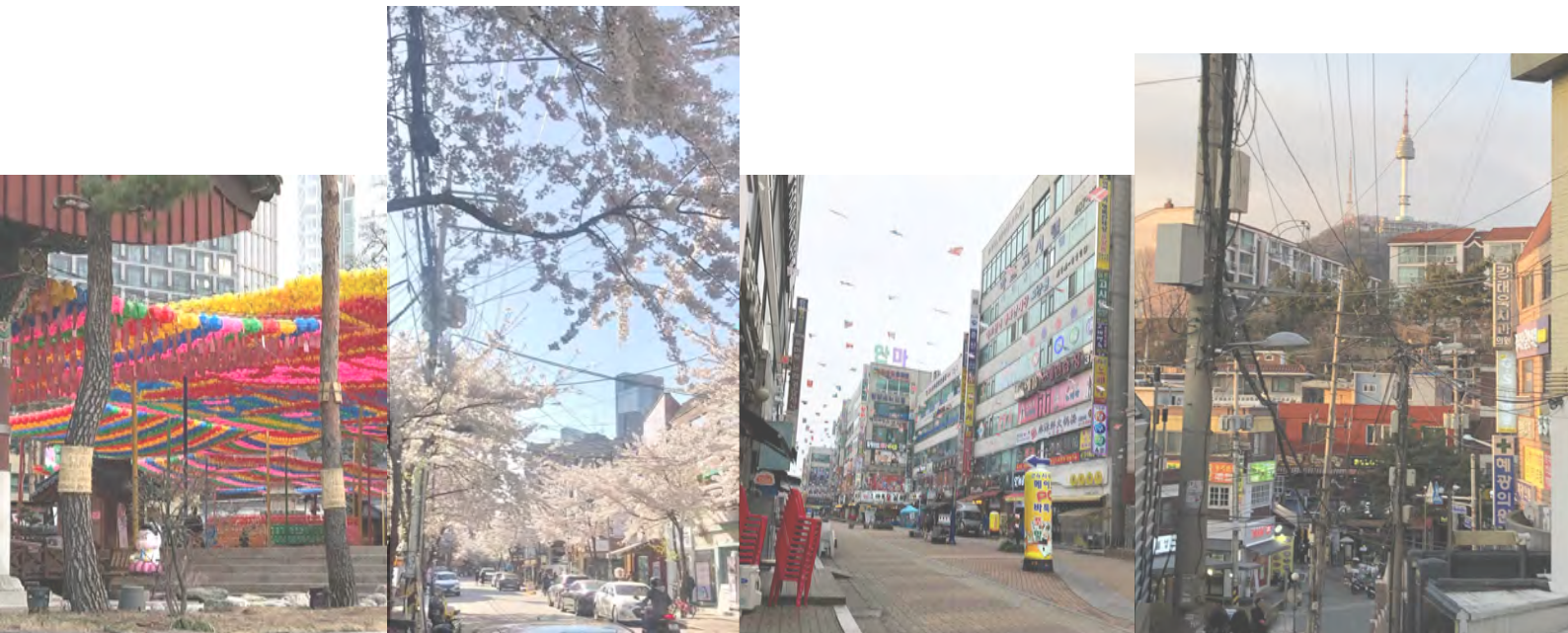
My decision about staying that far from Ansan also meant that I didn't get to spend that much time with the other exchange students, but they usually come to Seoul at the weekends for going out and having a good time. Despite the distance, I easily became good friends with exchange students, and I imagine that it will be even easier if you live in the dormitories, and when classes go back to normal. You'll also meet a lot of people when you go out, and it is surprisingly easy to meet and befriend both Koreans and other exchange students from different universities when you go out. The locals are in general very friendly and welcoming, so don't worry about asking for help and meeting people.

I also got to know three interns from the Danish embassy through a meeting I had there. The embassy provides an "intern apartment" in Itaewon where the interns live together, and I spent a lot of time with them during my time here.

Seoul has a lot of exciting neighborhoods, and you'll quickly discover that students mainly go to Hongdae or Itaewon, which are two of the city's most buzzing areas.

Hongdae is the university district and "the cheaper area" of Seoul. With a lot of bars, nightclubs, cheap shopping, and cafés its crowd is a bit younger, mainly students in their early 20s.

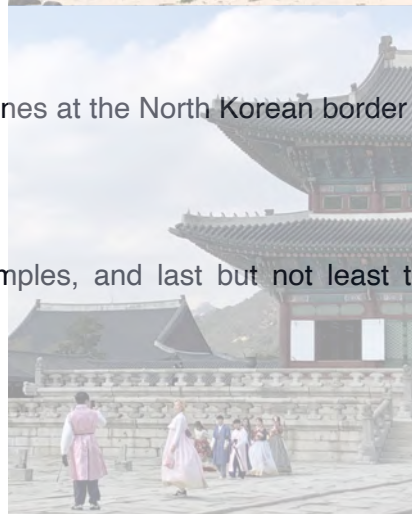
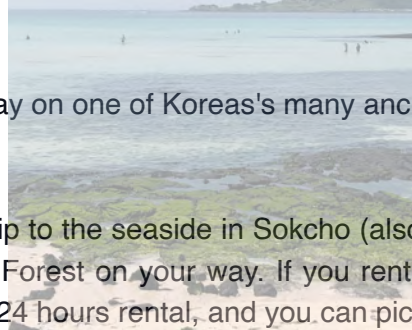
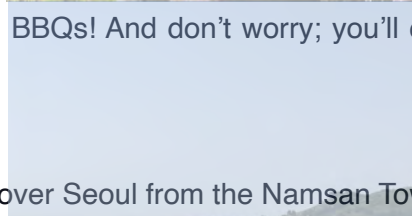
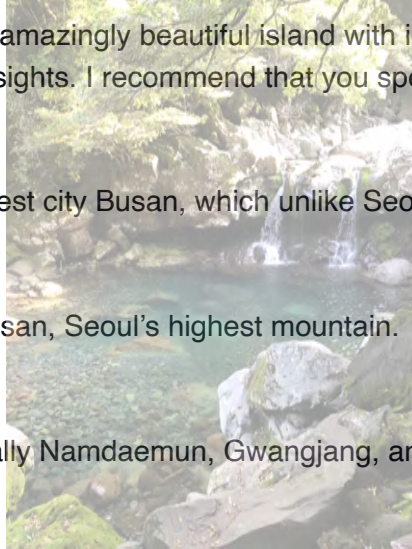
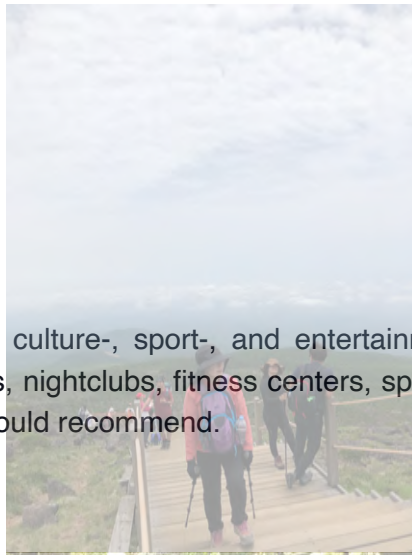
Itaewon is the "foreign" district of Seoul where local Koreans live along with expats and exchange students. I lived in Itaewon for most of my time in Seoul, and its central location makes it easy to go nearly anywhere in the city. This area has a bit older crowd with people in their middle-late 20s, and its also packed with bars, nightclubs, cute cafes, and good shopping.



A BRIEF BUCKETLIST

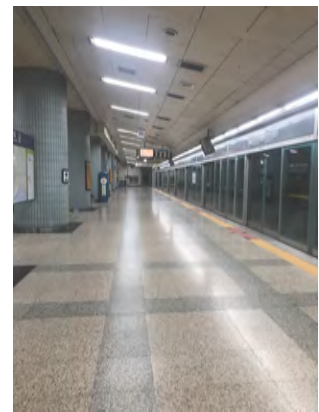
Because of Covid19, almost all culture-, sport-, and entertainment facilities were unfortunately closed during my stay (museums, nightclubs, fitness centers, sport clubs, etc). But there were still a few things I got to do which I would recommend.

1. Go to Jeju Island! It is an amazingly beautiful island with incredible beaches, waterfalls, and UNESCO world heritage sights. I recommend that you spent at least 3 whole days there.
2. Visit Korea's second-biggest city Busan, which unlike Seoul is located by the ocean.
3. Hike the beautiful Bukhansan, Seoul's highest mountain.
4. Visit the markets; Especially Namdaemun, Gwangjang, and Noryangjin fish market.
5. Eat out on lots of Korean BBQs! And don't worry; you'll quickly pick up "how to eat" when you go there.
6. Enjoy the incredible view over Seoul from the Namsan Tower or the Lotte Tower.
7. Try going on a Temple-Stay on one of Korea's many ancient temples.
8. Take a day or weekend trip to the seaside in Sokcho (also good for surfing), and/or visit the beautiful Wondaeri Birch Forest on your way. If you rent a car from "Lotte Car Rental" it's only around 350 DKK for 24 hours rental, and you can pick it up near the Seoul station.
9. Visit the DMZ and JSA zones at the North Korean border (Sadly I didn't get the chance due to Covid19).
10. Check out museums, temples, and last but not least the karaoke bars (Noraebangs in Korean).



PRACTICAL EXPERIENCES

I recommend you to go to Tranquebar Bookstore at Borgergade in downtown CPH. From what I know, they have the biggest selection of books about Korea and Seoul. I also bought a few travel, and city guides while I was here. If you're interested in reading some fiction I recommend you to read Han Kang, an acknowledged Korean writer. I applied for 5 different grants and ended up getting both The Nordea Fonden grant and Knud Højgaard grant which I've been really happy for. You'll need to spend some money on travel insurance, vaccines, deposit/prepaid housing, and flight tickets before you leave, so recommend that you either start saving up as soon as possible or/and apply for some grants. If you want to apply, be sure to make a detailed budget plan. You can refer to mine, which I put in *Appendix 7*.



PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

As mentioned earlier, I choose to stay “by myself” in Seoul, which is somewhere between 1-2 hours away from the campus grounds in Ansan, depending on whether you go with cab, bus, or subway. The transportation back and forth is pretty convenient, however, an odd thing for a capital like Seoul with almost 10 million inhabitants, is that public transportation doesn't run between midnight and 5 in the morning. If you somehow need to move around during the night, taxis are pretty much your only option. Luckily they're way cheaper than in Denmark!

Public transportation is very cheap in Korea, and make sure to buy a T-money card when you arrive. It is simply just Korea's answer to the Danish “Rejsekort”. You can easily buy them, and reload them in any convenience store, and in the automats on the subway stations.

After a few weeks, you'll receive your student card which can also function as a T-money card.

WIFI ACCESS

If you prefer, the university provides a few different sim card options for fair prices when the semester starts. In some cases, it will be convenient to have a Korean phone number, and a sim card also gives constant access to the internet. However, I never got any sim card since you can access public wifi pretty much everywhere in the cities, even the busses each have their own free wifi! All bars, cafes, and restaurants also provide wifi, so sim card is not a “must” if you ask me.



STAYING

For my first week, I rented a room through Airbnb in Ansan with a nice Korean family. I thought it would be nice to start the semester a bit closer to the University, but since it was postponed I quickly found a new room in Seoul.

I got along just fine by renting different “long term” rooms on Airbnb throughout my semester, and my hosts were always really helpful, welcoming, and friendly. There are also a lot of Facebook groups where you can find accommodation if you don't want to stay at the dormitories on campus.

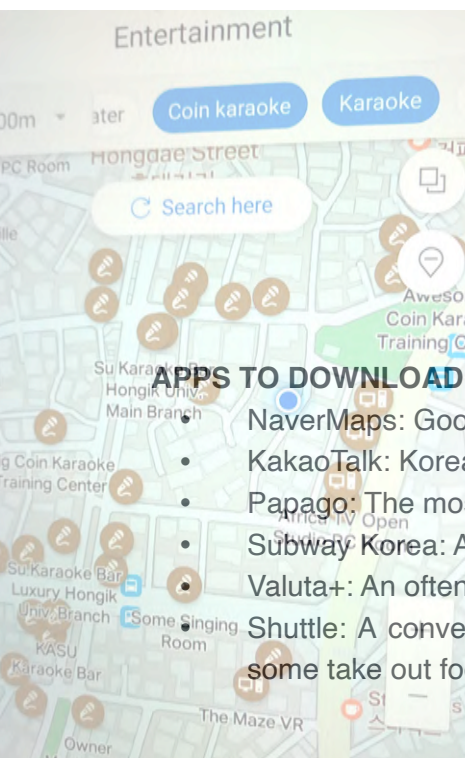


COST OF LIVING

Korea is actually not very much cheaper than Denmark. Small local eateries are the cheapest option if you want to go out for dinner. But especially groceries are usually the same price level as in Denmark, if not a bit more expensive. You probably should be able to get along with your SU, but if you want to do some shopping, like to go out, and/or want to travel around I recommend that you bring some more money! If you ask me, it's a shame to live too frugal when you travel like this.

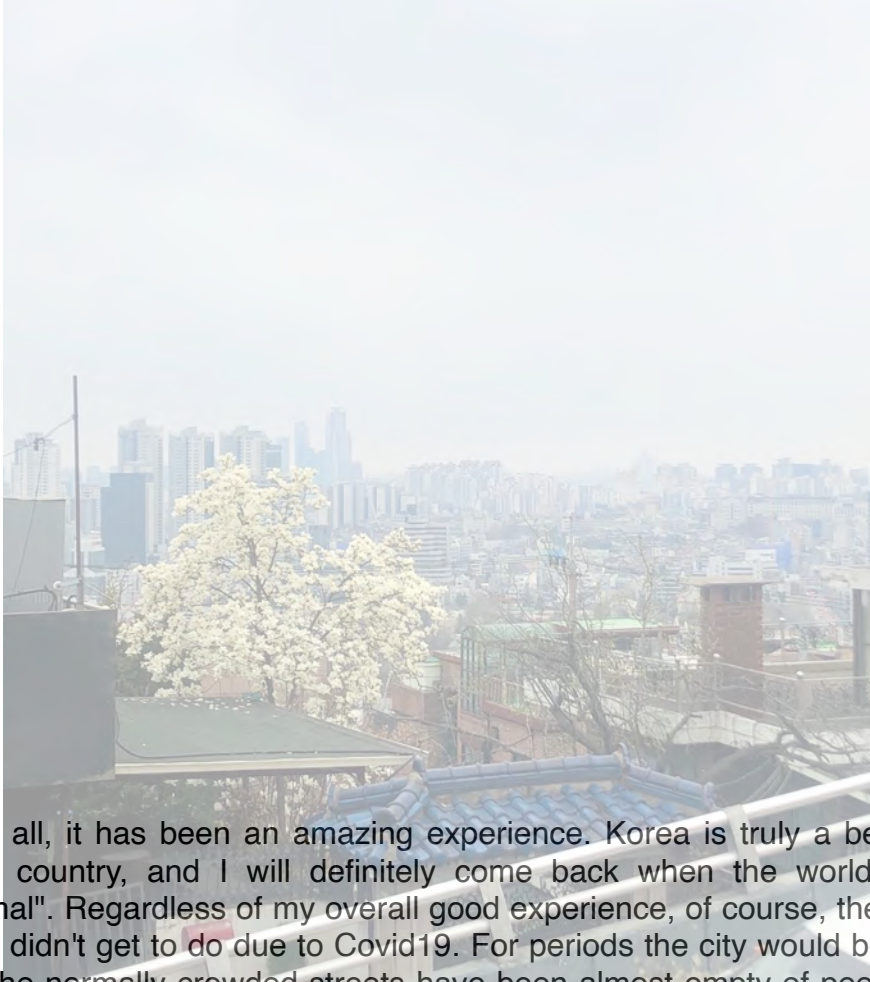
Here are some average prices to give you a perspective:

- Cappuccino: 5.500 KRW (30 DKK ish)
- Beers: 4.000-8.000 KRW (25-45 DKK ish)
- Cocktails: 8.000-14.000 KRW (45-90 DKK ish)
- Korean BBQ dinner: 14.000-20.000 KRW (80-110 DKK ish)
- Subway fares: 1.200-2.500 KRW (7-14 DKK ish)
- Taxi from Ansan to Seoul: 40.000 KRW (220 DKK ish)

- NaverMaps: Good for looking up journeys, addresses, and directions.
- KakaoTalk: Korea's main communication platform, used everywhere by everyone.
- Papago: The most accurate translation-app, and phrasebook.
- Subway Korea: A live overview of Seoul's Subways.
- Valuta+: An often convenient and offline working app that allows you to convert currencies.
- Shuttle: A convenient app if you once in a while get tired of going out and wanna order some take out food.



CONCLUSION

All in all, it has been an amazing experience. Korea is truly a beautiful, interesting, and great country, and I will definitely come back when the world is somewhat back to "normal". Regardless of my overall good experience, of course, there were a lot of things I sadly didn't get to do due to Covid19. For periods the city would be in a state of lockdown and the normally crowded streets have been almost empty of people throughout my stay. On the other hand, Covid19 made it less hectic to go around and explore nature, and other things that were actually open because we were the only "tourists" still staying in the country.

School-wise, to be honest, I didn't give it much attention but ended up with fine grades anyway. Of course, it depends on your courses and expectations towards yourself, but overall it isn't very grueling. You will have plenty of time to enjoy and experience on the side. Now that every lecture was taught online and everything was so unclear due to the Covid19-chaos, it occurred to me that Hanyang University is a huge institution, which made it kind of difficult for me as an exchange student to overcome all its offers and possibilities. Also, be prepared that you won't get the same feedback from professors as we're used to at KEA. Out of all the assignments I did, I only got comments/written feedback from one or two of them.

During my four months, and a few weeks' stay, the country, the university, and basically everything else was in an unusual state, which hopefully won't affect your trip quite as much as it affected mine. However, I hope you'll find some of this information useful, and enjoy your semester abroad. I'm definitely going back to Korea as soon as I get the chance.

2. Course Introduction

Speaking	Speaking class is divided into a study section and a usage section. In the study portion, students learn the grammar, vocabulary, and topic for that day's class, which are organized to facilitate the ability to use them in basic dialogues. In the usage portion of the class, students use the grammar and expressions studied that day to complete given tasks.
Listening	In listening and speaking class, which is task-based, the emphasis is placed on activities where students acquire important information by listening. The role of the teacher in these activities is not to explain or tell the students what it is they are listening to, but rather to help and guide the students in understanding the information that is being heard so that they are able to discuss it amongst themselves.
Reading	Reading activities go beyond the level of reading a test and understanding it. Rather, they are learner-centered, focusing on student interactions and speaking creatively about the topics. After students read a passage, they use that passage as the basis for speaking and writing activities.
Writing	In writing class, students learn to understand a variety of expressions and the structure of the Korean language. In this class, students practice and enhance their vocabulary. In the first stage of writing, students think and write, following the instructor's consistent guidance. Later on, students receive individual instruction that helps them to express themselves accurately and fluently.
